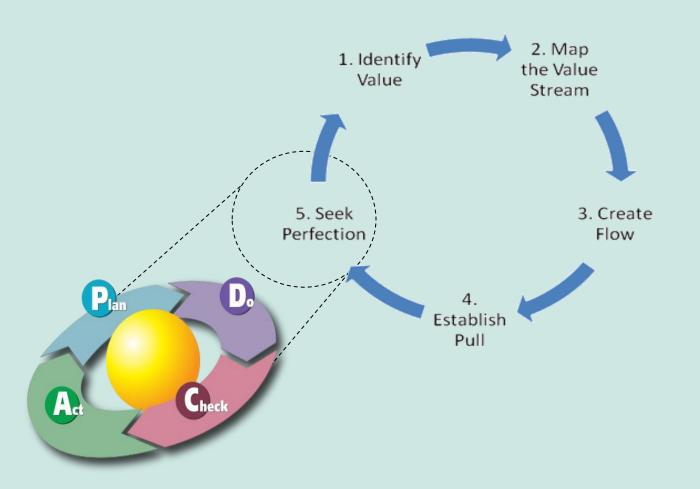

Kaizen Events

- APP Process 235 distinct steps reduced to 84 steps (65% reduction) [Team: 7 ADEQ; 3 External]
- Title V Class 1 Permit Process 166-369 steps reduced to 67-99 (60-73% reduction) [Team: 10 ADEQ; 3 External]
- Compliance and Enforcement Process Goals: reduce time from inspection to issuance by 70%; reduce review times by 30%



APP Outcome

What's different?

- Combined activities
- Reduced loops
- Increased communication
- Reduced number of steps
- Shorten time frame
- · Reduced hand offs
- Less wait time
- Cost effective
- Project manager empowerment
- Increased interaction with customers
- Ask what our customers value
- · Receptiveness to more communication during substantive review phase
- Being involved, give input and a chance to learn
- More appreciation for FA review
- Agency's willingness to open up a process for critical discussion
- Improved guidance



Title V Outcome

What's different?

- Fewer Handoffs
- Admin review defined and significantly shortened
- Reduced Do Over loops and escalation process
- Increased communication opportunity
- Shorter process time for same level of environmental protection
- More cooperation between customer and agency
- Process Standardization
- Reduced staff touches
- More authority for engineer to make decision
- Improved application due to increased communication and guidance
- Clearer expectations
- Feel of empowerment
- Cost reduction
- Faster permits
- Fewer opportunities to stop the clock
- Better applications and better buy in from applicant
- Combined functions for tasks
- Better consensus
- More opportunity to be heard in a clearer way
- Decisions made at a lower level
